Industry sectors covered by COCIR




COCIR is a non-profit trade association, founded in 1959 and having offices in Brussels and China, representing the medical technology industry in Europe

Round 1 - Why a shared EU-vision can help harness digital innovation to transform health and care for our ageing society?



Why a shared vision is important?

- No single organisation alone can bring about the changes needed to transform European health and care delivery models and scale-up digital health innovation.
- It is critical to develop shared goals (What do we want to achieve by 2020) and a shared vision (How) to ensure that all stakeholders work in the same direction and align their efforts towards a common set of shared goals.
- However, policymakers need to lead and drive the changing process.
- Ownership and stewardship of the overall process is also essential.
 Clearly different stakeholders will need to agree on a shared vision and work together to deliver the transformational changes needed, BUT it is important to ensure strong political support, long-term funding, careful planning and management throughout the process







Round 2. - How can this shared vision support industry?



How can this shared vision support industry?

- Industry needs a truly Digital Single Market where companies can scale-up innovation in the field of active and healthy ageing across different EU markets.
- Bringing together the whole innovation and business ecosystem in the area of health and wellbeing (including all levels of government (national AND regional), large companies AND SMEs, researchers, patients, doctors ...) to agree on a SHARED vision is the first step towards this goal.
- A shared vision is then allow us to start work jointly on key issues for industry such as:
 - The "enablers" for scaling-up digital health solutions (data privacy, interoperability, alignment of incentives, workforce skills, reimbursement models)
 - Building evidence on health outcomes and quality of life, but also on the economic models that can better support large scale innovation
 - Explore innovative public-private partnerships across the different phases of digital health innovation (from early research to deployment)
- It is important ALSO to agree on HOW we will deliver this shared vision. What mechanisms need to be put in place to deliver?

COCIR White Paper Integrated Care: Better Healthcare for Europe

Benefiting from Innovation in Technology and Financial Models

For many years rising Gross Domestic Product (GDP) and a relatively young population allowed European healthcare systems to offer comprehensive coverage at acceptable levels of investment. During this period the quality and quantity of life enjoyed by European citizens increased markedly. Today however, the limits to the sustainability of European healthcare systems are already visible. Projected growth in demand and cost linked to the rise in chronic diseases and an aging population are likely to result in increased rationing. Accordingly there has never been a greater need to develop and implement new Integrated Care strategies that will drive healthcare efficiencies and improve clinical outcomes for people, and there is growing recognition that such investment not only reaps clinical benefits but can also drive economic prosperity. This paper argues that adopting an Integrated Care approach; taking advantage of the development of personalised medicine and of connected health¹; diversifying financing and adopting more flexible financing models²; and moving from a 'fee-for-service' towards a 'payment-for-outcome' model can efficiently and measurably improve the experience and quality of care, whilst reducing the demand on more costly and resource-intensive services. Medical technology and eHealth will play key roles in this future, enabled by the right policy and investment frameworks.



- 5 INVEST in scaling-up successful integrated care projects and methodologies and support experience sharing
